From The Pastor....

Dear Friends in Christ,

At the special congregational meeting held last month, the people of St. Paul made two important decisions. First, by vote of 31 in favor, one opposed and two abstentions, you affirmed Christ's mandate to inclusivity by inviting a family to return to fellowship with us. Jesus' goal in coming into the world is laid out in Jn. 17:21, "...that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you sent me." Your actions in restoring this family to membership are a clear witness to the community that we are serious about following Christ's example of love and forgiveness.

The second decision made with 29 yes votes and four abstentions was equally significant. It sets the completion of the formal redevelopment covenant with our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod and Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) at June 30, 2020 instead of December 31. Completing the formal redevelopment covenant with our synod and the ELCA on June 30 allows us to reap the benefits of having the mission redeveloper onboard to provide continuity during the key events of this transitional period (Advent/Christmas, Lent/Easter, Confirmation) while providing opportunity to call a spring seminary graduate or pastor looking to move over the summer months for family reasons.

Needless to say, pastors willing to change calls at this time are in very short supply. St Paul must be patient-- and prayerfully so. Strengthened by God's Word and the promise of His comfort and care, let us determine to go forward together in confidence and joy.

Council Corner

As we approach the arrival of October, our thoughts turn toward a host of fall activities celebrating the return to school, a bountiful harvest, a Happy Halloween, and the coming of fall and winter. For members of your Church Council, it is also a time of preparation for our congregational meeting on November 10 and fiscal year 2020. Although our worship focuses on several special events that provide us with opportunities to thank God for His goodness and generosity, the Council must also focus on the daily business of providing a clean, comfortable, and well-maintained sanctuary and building facility for worship and the many programs that depend upon St. Paul as a meeting place. You, of course, are an important part of that process.

At our special congregational meeting on Sunday, September 15, the congregation voted to accept Council's recommendation to conclude St. Paul's three-year revitalization program six months early. Although we have benefitted from the program in many ways under the leadership of Pastor Carl Filer, it is now time to look to the future of St. Paul with a new permanent pastor—a full-time or part-time minister who will continue the important work of growing St. Paul.

Just four days after the special congregational meeting, on September 19, Council met for its regular monthly session. Although the September meeting often involves closing out summer activities and focusing on the return to Sunday School, it also begins the budget review necessary to provide the congregation with an accurate picture of the financial plan that will carry us through 2020. As I write this month's column, we find ourselves in the midst of a pleasant stretch of warm, dry weather. Outdoor activities abound, and few events have had to be cancelled because of severe weather (at least, not here in northeastern Pennsylvania). At the Council work session, however, we found ourselves "guess-timating" the severity of the winter and how much funding we should budget for ice and snow removal. Council works from a budget template developed by the Finance Committee several years ago, and each line item is reviewed and discussed in appropriate detail. Sometimes the budget session lasts for 90 minutes or more; this year we finished our work in about an hour. The budget review session is one of the many times during the year when we scrutinize the budget numbers in comparison to the actual expenditures for the current financial year. In short, your elected Council members (especially our dedicated treasurer, Ingrid Unternahrer) take the financial responsibility of providing for St. Paul's needs seriously. Looking toward June 30, 2020, and the end of our revitalization program, Council has planned to adjust the Pastoral Leadership category of the budget proposal for what we hope (and pray) will be a relatively short period. For the first six months of 2020 we will continue to support Pastor Filer's salary and benefits package at its 2019 rate; once we move into July we will return to a supply pastor agreement for an undetermined time period. Council has begun to explore some of the options available to us for supply pastors (including some within Monroe County); in addition, Pastor Filer will be guiding us through the Call Process early next year in an effort to minimize the vacancy at St. Paul. Only God knows the duration of this interim period, but as we have seen before, there is much to be gained from the variety of perspectives presented by visiting worship leaders.

As we enter the month of October, typically the month of greatest stewardship emphasis at St. Paul, let's continue to reflect on our offerings of time, talent, and treasure. This October, specifically, let's pay particular attention to the *Giving* section of Pastor Zach Zehnder's **Red Letter Challenge.**

<u>Red Letter</u> Challenge – Comments by Bev Otten

As I write this, we are on Day 10 and moving toward the end of the **Being** week. During this week, Zach Zehnder highlighted a very important point, "almost 60% of Christians around the world say their hectic lives prevent them from spending time with God...But when we fill our schedules every minute of the day, we lose focus. We get wrapped up in things that aren't important and just don't matter...Family, friends, job, house and money are all important, but all of them will let you down at some point...Jesus wants to be our top priority...We need to say 'No' to many good things, so we can say 'Yes' to the best thing."

This opportunity to spend time with the words of Christ on a daily basis for 40 days is one way of putting our priorities in order. I, personally, found this book to be helpful to me in strengthening my relationship with Christ and was the reason I suggested we offer members of this congregation the opportunity to participate in this "challenge". When this newsletter is printed we will be engaged in the **Serving** week and will have completed the **Forgiving** week. By taking the words of Jesus and putting them together by principle, Pastor Zehnder provided a concise way to understand Christ's desire for the lives of His followers. The last two weeks of the *Red Letter* Challenge encourage us to evaluate our attitude toward **Giving** and our participation in **Going**.

A car which is parked in the church's parking lot several days a week has a sticker which asks the question, "Do your follow Christ this closely?" After having completed this "challenge," I believe many of us are better able to answer that question, but only God and we know that answer in regard to our relationship with Christ. I hope by spending time in the Word during these 40 days, the Holy Spirit has reinforced each person's desire to continue to follow Christ closely. And, as Pastor Zehnder reminded us, there are times when we all fail. Thank God for His forgiveness. Let us pray that the Holy Spirit guide us to be appropriate representatives for Christ wherever we walk.

Wants, needs, and the path to contentment

There is great gain in godliness combined with contentment; for we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it; but if we have food and clothing, we will be content with these. But those who want to be rich fall into temptation and are trapped by many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction.-1

Timothy 6:6-9

When Apple released a new iphone some years ago, our teenager grew unhappy with the one that had been a treasured birthday present only a few months earlier.

"I really need a new iphone," we were told with urgency and expectations. Sensible parents, we said no, pointing out that a new iphone was definitely a want, not a need. Our teen stormed off, outraged by the injustice and deprivation.

Children and youth are forgiven for confusing wants and needs, but many of us reach adulthood without the knowledge. The distinction is especially hard to learn in our consumer culture, where every advertisement tells us that true happiness is forever just one more purchase away. When we believe this lie, we suffer lives of insatiable desire, ever grasping for the newer, the better, the larger, the more.

Mature faith and biblical stewardship challenge us to distinguish our wants from our needs, so that we may find contentment with "enough"- decent housing, healthy food, clean clothing and reliable transportation. No longer slaves to a desire for more, we are free to enjoy the abundant life that comes from loving relationships with God and family and neighbor.

Getting free may take discipline, but with God's help we can grow. Faced with desire, we pray: "Is this a need or a want? If it's a want, why do I sense it's a need? Can I be content without it?"

Finding contentment, we open ourselves to the life God intends for us, rich and abundant in love, joy and grace.

Stewardship Snippets

October 6,2019 (Time after Pentecost- Lectionary 27, Proper 22, Year C)

Luke 17:5-6- The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our Faith!" The Lord replied, "If you had the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you"

The apostles want more faith, but Jesus says they need only have faith the size of a mustard seed. In both our congregational and personal lives, more is not always needed—whether it's more faith, more behinds in the pews, more money, or more stuff. What would Jesus say to us today?

October 13,2019 (Time after Pentecost- Lectionary 28, Proper 23, Year C)

2 Kings 5:10-11- "Elisha sent a message to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean. But Naaman became angry and went away, saying "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure leprosy!"

What we want and what we need are often quite different. Because of his status Naaman wanted and expected the "royal" treatment in his healing. Sometimes the simpler blessings are exactly what we need. Be grateful for all of God's amazing gifts- no matter the packaging, timing, or messenger.

October 20, 2019 (Time after Pentecost- Lectionary 29, Proper 24, Year C)

Luke 18:7- And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them?

We want what we want in this life, but God knows exactly what we need and won't forsake us. Listen carefully for God's guidance and then be fearless and persistent in seeking what God desires for you. Listening to and for God is good Stewardship!

October 27. 2019 (Time after Pentecost- Lectionary 30, Year C)

Psalm 84:5- Happy are those whose strength is in you, in whose heart are the highways to Zion. Sometimes our wants are not in line with the values of a follower of Jesus. Humans are great at rationalizing and justifying wants. What we NEED is to turn to God with all our heart, mind, and strength. In doing so, God will align our wants to the divine will so that we may have life abundant. Are you finding your strength in God, or are you relying on your own bootstraps and will?

You hear it all the time, "Our church is like our family". It is a sentiment shared by many here at St. Paul, and throughout most churches. As a group, a church can thrive, as long as everyone is sharing in the work and duties. Not all members of a church family share the same talents and strengths. This is a GOOD thing. All those different abilities allow us to utilize everyone's talents to grow the church and its ministry. Even those members who have limitations can contribute. Everyone can do something and as a family we can help place each member in a position that compliments their talents and limitations.


